Teenagers around the school probably have many questions about it. While most of our student body cannot vote this year, it is still important to be educated about this subject. After all, we are the future of this nation. With that being said, here are answers to some of the most common questions:

Why was the Electoral College created?

It was first adopted in 1787 by the members of the Constitutional Convention and was created as a compromise. One side of the delegates strongly believed that Congress shouldn't have anything to do with picking the president due to a lot of opportunities for corruption. The other side argued that the people should directly decide who the president is. Finally, they concluded that voters would choose electors (the amount depends on the state) whose purpose is to determine who will be the president and vice president.

Why do some states have more electors?

The number of electors is based on the total number of legislators a given state has in the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate. Population data mostly determines the number of House representatives.

What is the significance of swing states?

"Swing states" are states that could go either right or left in the election, and because of this, candidates have to spend a lot more time trying to win these states because some could be what the election comes down to, so they are very important. The swing states this year are Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. Election season is a time when

Daylight saving time (DST) has everyone in the USA (unless they're citizens of Arizona or Hawai'i) set their clocks back an hour in the fall and forward an hour in the spring. The official explanation for this is that it makes the most of our hours of daylight; therefore, the nation's energy consumption is reduced. This is no longer the case when all of our modern

devices are taken into account. So, what is the real purpose?

The main benefactors of DST are sports teams and retailers. The prolonged daylight in the afternoon leads to better retail sales, as people getting out of work are more likely to feel like going shopping if it's still light out. Sports teams also benefit from the longer daylight hours because they can play outside longer before visibility decreases. There are, however, people whose work suffers under DST. Many believe that farmers' workdays are prolonged by the time change, but evidence supports that it has no effect, other than to make things harder. A report from The Daily Yonder states, "For farmers, it meant less time in the morning to milk their cows before the delivery truck showed up... and less time for the dew to dry before needing to harvest their crops," (Fischer). The claim here is that farmers and their plants and animals follow the sun, not the time. So when the sun comes up, now later in the day, anything on a timed schedule will continue, not waiting for them to be ready.

I also feel like I see much more engagement with learning and fewer distractions when I'm in the classroom." Most students aren't huge fans of the new phone policy which has resulted in some students sneaking phones during class and in the restroom. There is a "three strikes and you're out" policy when you are caught. Upon your first offense, your guardian must pick up the phone from the office and you will serve one detention. The second offense is the same, but you are required to serve two detentions instead of one. And on the final third strike, your guardian must pick up the phone, you must serve a full day of OSS, and

> you must turn your phone into the office daily.

However, this policy is here to stay. Johnson has been asked if we will continue to enforce this policy and he states, "I do feel like we will continue to enforce the current cell phone policy next year. I can't say for sure if there will be any adjustments to the policy; however, we

will assess it, get feedback on its effectiveness, and see if there are tweaks that need to be made."
