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SPRING BREAK GETAWAY WITH FSHS TRAVEL CLUB

After a two-year wait, the FSHS Travel Club finally embarked on its next adventure, kicking off Spring Break with a trip to Europe.

Our first stop on our voyage was Berlin, which, to me (Bronson), was rich in history but visually unappealing. Its inconsistent design and structure almost serve as a symbol of the tragic events that have occurred there. Our group ate about everything we could get our hands on - sausages, bread, and sauerkraut to name a few. We visited the Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, the Reichstag, and the Soviet War Memorial in Treptower Park. We were also given a tour of Sanssouci Palace in Potsdam, which was beautiful and very large. Returning to the topic of Berlin, the sharp contrasts between the East and West were immediately noticeable. In that way, modern Berlin feels like a massive art piece, reflecting the divisions of the Cold War. Although I found the city visually unappealing, it was one of the most fascinating places we visited.

ur next city we visited was Prague in the Czech Republic. While travelling, we stopped by Dresden. We then took a walking tour of the city, which included many historical statues and buildings. Additionally, some went to look at the beautiful Frauenkirche Church. Upon arrival in Prague, we took another walking tour through an incredible town square, surrounded by enormous castles and churches with striking Gothic architecture. The next day, we explored more landmarks, including the St. Vitus Cathedral and the Charles Bridge, before having free time to explore the city on our own. My group (Claire) decided to grab lunch, visit a cafe, and try Trdelník - also called Chimney Cake

in English- a traditional Czech Republic pastry. Finally, of course we had to purchase some souvenirs.

Our next destination was Kraków. We began by traveling atop a hill to see St. Mary's Basilica, which was, in my opinion (Claire), the most beautiful attraction of the trip. It was designed incredibly with colorful stained glass and many gold statues. That night, we had Polish dumplings called pierogies, which were a favorite among the group. The following day was undoubtedly the saddest day of the trip, as we spent our morning visiting the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial site. While the experience was devastating to see, being there provided a deeper understanding of it in person.

provided a deeper understanding of it in person. Afterward, we had lunch with the group before exploring the town for ourselves. Krakow was certainly my favorite city (Claire).

The last city we visited was Budapest, which was very pretty. The first day we were there it rained, which added to the feeling that Hungary was a very different country to the others we had just visited. Enormous, beautiful buildings, such as the parliament building, the castle district, and St. Stephen's Basilica were everywhere. We experienced the very odd language of Hungarian; it sounds completely different from the other languages I (Bronson) was used to hearing on the trip. Fortunately, former FSHS student Ottó Voller (whom we hung out with for most of our Budapest escapades) spoke Hungarian, so it wasn't too bad. Ottó enthusiastically ordered our entire table Goulash and Lángos, fried bread dough with garlic cream sauce and cheese. Both of




